Upper wall in Resene Quarter Frozen, lower wall and floor in Resene Spinnaker. Iceberg painted 'headboard' in Resene Sea Fog, Resene Frozen and Resene Blue Moon. Dresser in Resene Quarter Frozen (upper) and Resene Spinnaker (lower), shelf in Resene Blue Moon and pendant lamp in Resene Bright Spark. Plant pot in Resene Matisse and vases in Resene Frozen, Resene Matisse, Resene Bullitt and Resene Fuel Yellow. 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If you're going to go all-out in imagining a fun space that your kids will truly embrace as their own, deciding on a theme is a great place to start. Brainstorm with your child to help focus on one or two of their favourite things that could be combined together, or even get them to draw what their dream bedroom looks like. While you might not be able to recreate it exactly, it can help your child to feel like they're really the one wearing the designer's shoes.

Start by anchoring the theme with a feature piece. This might be a favourite picture or poster, a striking duvet or a cool bedhead, then build everything else off of that. To carry the theme further, think beyond the walls when it comes to painting and decorating. Consider how you can include the floor, ceiling, furniture and accessories, such as frames, in your Resene paint colour palette, and how soft furnishings, ornaments and other decorations can all add to the finished effect.

You should also think about how long you want to go before having to redecorate. Try and choose a design based on a theme that will be age appropriate for several years, and

one that they've been interested in for a while, rather than just the passing flavour of the month. Remember, paint is one of the easiest things to change out when your child's design choices change!

If you're stuck for a place to start when it comes to choosing colours with your kids, have a look at the Resene KidzColour collection – a range of shades in every colour of the rainbow, with a few metallics for good measure. Colour options have been tested with a range of children of all ages giving a collection that is full of bright bold, saturated colours for fun features, such as Resene Glitterbug and Resene Wham, and softer pastels, from soft Resene Pretty In Pink to Resene Three Wishes.

Fun paint features need not be limited to the walls. In this cute room, the walls have been kept neutral and the spotlight has instead turned onto the floor. Painted with broad stripes of Resene Rice Cake and Resene Smokescreen the colours and design match the duvet cover, while the furniture and decor have been painted to complement other colours in the bedding while playing up the dog theme. Bed frame and picture frame in Resene Toffee, dresser in Resene Rice Cake with drawers in (from top to bottom) Resene Blue Jeans, Resene Smokescreen and Resene Toffee, house shelves in Resene Rice Cake and Resene Blue Jeans



other cool theme ideas:

- Bring outside in paint the room to look like an outdoor area with a garden, mountainscape or desert island.
- Go sporty and tailor the space around a favourite sport or team.
- Take things under the sea with graduated blue walls and a ceiling covered in sea creatures.
- Pick a favourite toy or cartoon character and build a world around them
- Take a trip and bring a space scene or favourite place they've always dreamed of visiting into their bedroom.
- What about a circus, a pirate ship or a fairy tale castle?
- You can keep things simple by sticking to a single main colour and paint in a variety of shades of that colour.
- You could also consider painting the room a neutral colour and layering it with replaceable features, such as pictures, cushions and bedding. Or allocate a feature wall and focus on keeping that refreshed every few years and the rest of the room more neutral.

Focusing on a simple detail, like a repeating pattern in your child's bedding or a motif in a cute piece of artwork, you can use the colour to inspire your Resene paint colour and the theme of the entire space. Simply bring the item into your local Resene ColorShop and Resene staff can help you find the same hue in paint. Using a high quality paint brush – one with lots of bristles – makes easier work of hand painting flowers like these on to your child's wall. Wall in Resene Triple Concrete, headboard in Resene Norwester, flowers in Resene Grenadier, Resene Wax Flower, Resene Cupid, Resene Ziggurat and Resene Norwester and bedside table in Resene Wax Flower (outside) and Resene Norwester (drawers).

Bring some wild style to your kid's room with a jungle safari theme. In a nation surrounded by ocean, chances are that if you don't own a boat yourself you probably know someone else who does. Sailing is part of our history and our love and respect for the ocean doesn't have to end on dry land. Turn a bedroom into a high seas adventure with a fun and graphic theme anchored with favourite Resene paint colours, Resene Sea Fog, Resene Explorer, Resene Tangaroa, Resene Raging Bull, Resene Pirate Gold and Resene Half Black White.

Make waves on the wall using a dinner plate to trace semi-circle shapes before painting in Resene Explorer. Add nautical flourishes to the room such as the life preserver which is easily created by tying cotton rope and macrame twine around a wreath and painting in Resene Raging Bull.

Go for bold black and create your very own bat cave. These lower walls have been painted in Resene Nero, which has also been carried to the upper walls in a grid pattern over pale grey Resene Mystic. The grid is most easily achieved by painting the whole wall in Resene Nero, masking the grid, then painting over it with Resene Mystic. The lightshade has also been painted with Resene Nero over removable bat stickers. When the paint is touch dry, you can peel the bats off so that when the light shines through the shade, the winged shapes will be projected around the room. You can easily create your own bat stickers by drawing your bat shapes onto self-adhesive paper then sticking them onto the shade ready for painting. The rest of the bat and comic book-themed furnishings and decorations are easily changeable so that when it's time for a new theme, it is simple to remove them. And what teenager wouldn't want a black bedroom?

a succulent scheme

Choosing an unexpected but simple motif such as a cactus - can be the basis for a fun room theme, and another that could also be easily adapted to a different theme if succulents begin to feel less than enticing. These walls have been finished in Resene Fringy Flower with the blue triangle trim painted in Resene Sea World. The same two colours are repeated throughout the room including the striped floor, bedside table and shelf, so the colour scheme does most of the heavy lifting. The large cactus pot was first painted in Resene Alabaster then covered in triangle stickers. It was then painted in Resene Black and, when touch dry, the stickers were removed to let the white show through. You can create your own triangle stickers using selfadhesive paper and drawing and cutting out your shapes to suit.

purrfect in pink

For the cat lovers out there, you can get a little wild with a leopard print floor by first painting two coats of Resene Paper Doll then drawing or stencilling the pattern on top using Resene Walkon in Resene Foundry. While it may take a bit of time to finish, the result is dramatic! For extra protection and durability, finish it with Resene Concrete Wax. Since the floor takes centre stage in this room, the toned down Resene Geyser walls with Resene Paper Doll features – including the shelf and brackets – leave the leopard print with plenty of visual space to shine. Finish things off with a stool and bedside table painted in Resene Foundry and a bedside lamp in Resene Geyser to complete the look.

Painting a rectangular section of Resene Paper Doll behind an on-theme feature mirror makes for a cute dressing table area without taking up much space. The stool colour is Resene Foundry and the drawer box has been block painted in Resene Geyser, Resene Paper Doll and Resene Foundry.

This bedroom is a great example of how a lovely warm colour palette can make a space feel welcoming and relaxing. Using tones of a pastel colour such as peach offers a way to keep the overall effect soft and muted while leaving room to add bolder accents. Take your theme to the next level by using this same Resene colour palette to revive secondhand cane furniture. Clean furniture well before applying a coat of Resene Waterborne Smooth Surface Sealer, then two coats of Resene Beethoven.



Bold geometric shapes are a popular way to add colour without going overboard and can add real flair to a child's room with little effort. Bold stripes, triangles, chevrons and squares are all easy to create with just a bit of masking tape. It's a look that's simple enough that older children may even want to try creating them.

Bold shapes lend themselves to bold colours and unexpected matching. Double down on a daring palette and try mixing deep blue like Resene Surfs Up with a bright green, such as Resene Neva or Resene Tutti Frutti, or burnt orange like Resene Smoke Tree with vibrant turquoise, such as Resene Seeker or Resene Sea Green. Another great option is graduated stripes in different saturations of one colour, starting with the deepest at the bottom of the wall to the palest where it meets the ceiling.

If stripes aren't your thing, try blocking out shapes in different areas of the room to delineate spaces within it, such as a study zone, vanity or sleeping area.

Left: Painted wall hooks are not only an easy way to tie your colour scheme together but are a handy way to keep things tidy and get belongings up off the floor. We've painted our hooks in Resene Fizz, Resene Fountain Blue and Resene Double Cod Grev (try Resene Element). It's an effect that's dependant on the combination of high-contrast colours with careful measuring and masking. 

Kids will love this modern take on a jungle-themed bedroom with its vibrant stripes and splashy palette. The walls are in deep Resene Bunting with Resene Hi Jinx and Resene Keppel stripes and accents. Hints of stained wood, natural textures and plants keep bold palettes fresh and stop them becoming overwhelming.



Rejuvenate timber flooring with Resene Colorwood wood stain and finish with Resene Oristal ClearFloor to enhance the colour while still allowing the grain to show through.

Try unique combinations like this colour-blocked feature wall to break up a big space and keep things grounded. This room is finished in navy Resene Blue Night, Resene Big Bang and Resene Flower Power against a backdrop of Resene Half White Pointer on the walls and floor. The same colour scheme can be used for fun and easy DIY art projects to decorate the space.

top tip

Start with a duvet or cushion your child already loves and let them pick out two or three other colours to complement it.















Blurring is a creative alternative to conventional linear shapes. Bleeding colours into each other can really change the perspective of a room and keep it from becoming too boxy. Headboards can be an expensive addition to a room, particularly if there are multiple beds to accommodate. A cost-effective and clever way to add headboards – and a bit of extra colour – to any room is to paint them in. Plus, it's quick and easy to repaint a headboard if your child outgrows their bed or you are updating to a new room look.

Don't be afraid to think outside a traditional rectangle – the beauty of painting a headboard is that you can make it any shape or design you want. Geometrics are easy to mask up but you could also stencil, trace or draw your design freehand.

For practical, useful storage without taking up floor space, consider adding a shelf painted in the same colour or try painting your headboard with Resene FX Magnetic Magic paint so your child can decorate it with their favourite magnets.

Left: The warm grey Resene Surrender walls and floor in this room are given a dramatic lift with a Resene Blue Night headboard. outside the box

This simple yet effective headboard 'frame' was made from three lengths of flat profile skirting board painted in Resene Green Spring and screwed into the wall, which is painted in Resene FX Blackboard Paint. The beauty of a blackboard wall is that there's no limit to how your child can personalise it with chalk – and starting afresh is as simple as a quick wipe with a clean, damp cloth. Main wall in Resene FX Blackboard Paint, left wall in Resene Green Spring, floor in Resene Secrets, hook rack in Resene Rivergum, toy box in Resene Secrets and Resene Rivergum, headboard outline in Resene Green Spring, pendant lamp in Resene Paddock and nightstand in Resene Rivergum (drawers) and Resene Paddock.

Decorating a shared children's room can be tricky as those sharing the room are bound to have different ideas about how it should look. Search for some common ground between the two – a theme, colour or object that both kids love – and use this as your starting point. It might be something as simple as doughnuts, used in the room on the left in the bedlinen and accessories.

how to achieve harmony

- Give each child a separate area of the room to decorate, so they both get a say in how the room will look.
- For a cohesive feel, consider getting two of the same item for key furniture pieces, such as beds, desks and chests of drawers.
- Reversible duvet covers can be flipped to a different side on each bed so that each has a different pattern but the overall colour palette of the room stays the same.
- Add cushions and patterned pillowcases to mix up the bedding.
- Use toy boxes to keep a shared room tidy and paint them in a pattern that echoes the theme of the room.
- Use a paint effect to give each child their own 'zone', like this diagonal device, or just straight up and down between the beds.

Opposite and below: Divide up the space with a wall painted in Resene Frozen and Resene Sunkissed (try Resene Tulip Tree). The side wall is in Resene Foundry and the floor is in Resene Quarter Alabaster. A diamond pattern was created on the door to echo the bedlinen by painting the whole surface in Resene Quarter Alabaster and then masking it before painting sections in Resene Sunkissed and Resene Tussock. The toy box is painted Resene Quarter Alabaster with diamonds in Resene Frozen, Resene Tussock and Resene Sunkissed.

Above: If your kids will be sharing a colour scheme, look for other ways to create individuality between their personal spaces. Perhaps one would prefer a daybed over a traditional single or a patterned curtain to define their bed rather than a headboard? Even with these differences, a strong colour palette will make the space feel unified. Upper wall in Resene Half Athens Grey, lower wall in Resene Rakaia, timber floor in Resene Colorwood Mid Greywash, arch headboard and vase in Resene Cinnamon, skirting board and curtain pattern in Resene Eighth Masala, curtain rail, hook rack and stool top in Resene Ebony Clay and small plant pot in Resene Crail.

Just because your children share a bedroom doesn't mean they necessarily need to share a colour scheme. And using colour to clearly - and fairly - divide the space could serve as a way of keeping the peace between older children. The wall and floor on the left side of this room are painted in Resene Finch while the right side is in Resene Thor. To make the scheme feel cohesive, paint all the furniture in the same colour, such as Resene All Black, and choose artwork that shares a similar vibe or colours in common.

One thing is for certain: as your kids get older, they will change – and so will their tastes. from bassinet to bed

Over a 24-hour period, newborns typically sleep 14-19 of those hours, so it's important to have a place where they can get their rest undisturbed. Typically, this means the baby is going to need a room all to themselves. However, your nursery will be as much a place for mum, dad and other helpers as it is for baby, so your colour choices should be made up of ones that all of you will find calming. A darker colour for the lower part of the wall will help mask smudges and fingerprints from little hands as your baby grows into a toddler while a lighter colour up top will add visual height and levity.

Pick up a few Resene testpots in coordinating colours and let your child decorate under bed storage boxes or create artwork to suit their scheme. Resene Moccasin (try Resene Toffee), Resene Just Dance, Resene Twilight, Resene Sante Fe, Resene Apache, Resene Sorbet (try Resene Dust Storm) and Resene Kalgoorie Sands were used to paint the round artwork, banner and wooden boxes to match the rest of the scheme.

This sunset pink and terracotta colour scheme is built with neutrals at its base, which means that even if your child decides pink is no longer a preference, the room won't need a full makeover to completely change the look. Simply swap out the bedding and repaint the furniture and accessories – which is easy enough to do in a weekend. With some minor furniture swaps, areas that younger kids will use for more imaginative play can transition to a hangout or study space in their older years.

strike a chord

A simple painted shape can add fun and a subtle theme to a teen's room without having to go overboard. This guitar silhouette echoes a teen's musical passion and extends out from a part wall painted in zingy teal Resene St Kilda. The rest of the walls and floor are painted Resene Half Raven as a cooler contrast to create a strong graphic look. A bedside table and shelf painted in inky blue Resene Licorice breaks things up. A colour scheme like this one is also very age-neutral, so it will stay relevant as your child grows.

Go a step further than a typical starry sky and create glow-in-the-dark moons for the walls or ceiling of your budding astronaut's bedroom. For some, it's hard to imagine that it's possible to have both kids and a clean house. - clothing and essentials without needing to buy an additional piece of furniture.
- Use hooks to hang any dress-up costumes or hats to free up more space in bins and drawers.
- Purchase or build a shelving unit shaped like a dollhouse so that it doubles as both a 'toy' and storage.
- Install built-in benches with drawers to stow away bags, shoes or other toys.
- Repurpose old items like vintage suitcases or hatboxes and give them new life as toy trunks.
- Use a trolley even one that was originally intended as a kitchen or bar cart – as a mobile storage solution that can easily travel between play areas.
- Use a ladder to store spare blankets, quilts, throws or picture books by draping them over the rungs.

- Not only are woven baskets practical, they also aren't total eyesores in a kid's room. Use them to corral toys, books or even clothing and accessories.
- Spice shelves can be put to alternative purpose for storing picture books. Their narrow profile means they don't protrude as far out from the wall as typical shelves, and they don't take up the floor space that a bookcase does.

Of course, painting your storage baskets, bins and other tidying tools in colours to complement the room's colour scheme means they'll look more like décor and add to the room's design rather than detracting from it.

twinkle twinkle

Is there anything more soothing than the gentle glow of starlight? There's comfort in the constancy of star constellations, making them the perfect inspiration for a calm, serene nursery. Resene FX Nightlight glow-in-the-dark paint brings Matariki star cluster or Messier Object 45 (M45), to life. Known as the Pleiades in Ancient Greek mythology, the cluster also appears in one of the most wellknown Aboriginal tales, The Star Dreaming Story of the Seven Sisters. In Aotearoa, the stars are Matariki, and their appearance signals the beginning of Maori New Year, a time of harvest and celebration. The feature wall in Resene Warrior creates an inky evening background for the hand-painted Matariki and Southern Cross in Resene Black White, with an added dash of Resene FX Nightlight for a glow-inthe-dark effect

Right: Get your glow on by creating a Matariki skyline. The back wall is painted in Resene Warrior, with stars in Resene Black White and clusters topcoated in Resene FX Nightlight glow-inthe-dark. DIY circle garland

This simple garland is cute enough to keep up long after the celebration has ended.

you will need:

- Sheets of heavy white cardstock
- Your choice of Resene testpots we used Resene Smiles, Resene Splat, Resene Ethereal, Resene Alabaster and Resene Kandinsky
- Paint brush
- Twine or thin cord
- Round drinking glass
- Scissors or circle punch

step1 Paint one side of heavy cardstock or poster paper in each of the theme colours. Leave to dry for one hour.

step 2 Trace circles by using a drinking glass as a guide then cut them out with scissors. To speed things up, you can use a large craft punch instead.

step 3 Measure out the length of twine or cord you'll need to drape across the area you'll be decorating (our garland was 3 metres long). Lay the twine flat on a table and place the first circle under the twine. Then, glue another circle on top of the bottom circle so the twine is sandwiched in between them. Repeat the process for the whole garland, leaving a 5cm gap between each circle.

confetti tablecloth

Avoid a nightmarish clean-up by painting the confetti right onto the tablecloth. Using a round sponge brush and Resene testpots, create a randomised polka dot pattern all over the tablecloth by alternating each of the theme colours.

dipped effect cutlery

Wooden cutlery only needs a quick coat of paint to make it festive. Just measure 5cm up from the bottom of each utensil, mask it off and paint with your child's favourite colours using Resene testpots.

striped table runner

Layer your table with a sturdy runner to add extra colour. Using a ruler and pencil, measure and mark ten stripes, each 12cm wide, down the length of a 120cm x 30cm MDF board. Mask each section as you go and use Resene testpots to paint each stripe in colours that match your theme. Use a longer panel or multiple panels to suit the length of your table.

If you're not a confident artist, you can still create large natural shapes with a cross-stitch or pixelated effect. First draw your image on grid paper with coloured pencils. Then lightly pencil a grid pattern on the wall and recreate your drawing with paint. This subtle cross-stitch tree is perfect for an older child's bedroom. Recreate it using tonal greens and light browns with a creamy highlight for the swing. Start by painting the tree in Resene Sisal, Resene Caper, Resene Pale Leaf, Resene Soft Apple and Resene Parchment, then the swing in Resene Moon Glow. The wall is Resene Half Opal, the floor is Resene Colorwood Mid Greywash and the bedside table ties everything together in Resene Soft Apple.

a motorway for boundless play

When you love playing with cars, the world is your motorway. Help pave the way for creative play by using paint and masking to turn your child's bedroom or playroom into a whole world for them to explore. To add another dimension of play, the grassy section of the wall has been coated in Resene FX Magnetic Magic then topcoated. Attach strong magnets to the back of plywood shapes or small wooden toys – cars, trees, buildings, letters and numbers – and your kids can enjoy countless hours playing out stories on their walls. For even more fun, choose Resene FX Chalkboard Paint or Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen for your tinted topcoats and the surface will also work as a chalkboard. Resene Clover To create a mural like this at home, be sure to plan out your design first on paper and then pencil your design onto the wall. Work from back to front with even coats of paint. For most colours you'll need two coats. Painter's 'washi' masking tape, available from your local Resene ColorShop or buy online at shop.resene.com, is great for creating clean, straight lines, while a high quality paint brush — a soft one with lots of bristles — will make it easier to navigate when you're painting shapes freehand. Feather these strokes towards the middle of your painted shape and then use a small roller to fill in the rest for the smoothest finish.

reading roadways

With just a couple of plywood pieces, toy cars and Resene testpots, you can put a pair of boring bookends on the highway to fun. We painted ours in Resene Shark. Once dry, use masking tape and Resene Broom to create the dashed centre line. While this is drying, paint a few wooden or diecast vehicles using Resene testpots, such as Resene Sebedee, Resene Untamed (try Resene Clover) and Resene Double Cut Glass. Use quick bond glue to attach your road sections to the back of your metal bookends and each other so your shapes create an 'L' shape. Then, glue the vehicles onto your roadways.



fire engine drawers

A wooden set of drawers can make the perfect canvas to add a special detail to a themed room. To create an eye-catching fire truck like this one, paint a basecoat of Resene Cotton Wool then add in the details with Resene Rocket, Resene Blue Jeans, Resene Hi Jinx and Resene Bright Spark. The outlines and ladder are in Resene Ragamuffin (try Resene Quarter Pearl Lusta). Draw your design on paper first and decide which colours will go where then pencil it lightly on to the drawers. This look can be easily adapted to other types of vehicles – how about a police car, a monster truck or a Volkswagon beetle? Drawers like these make a great statement against neutral walls and flooring such as these ones in Resene Gull Grey and Resene Colorwood Mid Greywash.

tic tac toe

This simple design and colour scheme is an easy way to go bold with a primary palette that's perfect for a playroom. Resene Sea World on the wall grid, Resene Havoc on the table, crosses and hanging pot and Resene Shooting Star on the chairs and noughts provide a colour pop against the neutral wall and floor painted in Resene Pearl Lusta. Paint the square grid in Resene FX Chalkboard Paint or Resene FX Blackboard Paint over basecoats of Resene FX Magnetic Magic or even paint square cork tiles to bring a whole new dimension to the way your kids play.
