



Over the years, we have spent a lot of time working on paint formulas looking for ways to make them greener, from introducing the first waterborne paints to joining the Eco Choice programme 27 years ago. There have been so many weird and wonderful ideas we have tried over the years and many more that are still being worked on.

A recent favourite is plant based paints and stains with products like Resene Woodsman Decking Oil Stain. Our team have their green thumbs busy working on more of these plant based products that we look forward to sharing with you soon.

But as green as we can make the paint, the best way that paints can be 'eco', is what they do for the surface beneath them. Paints and stains are like good looking suntan lotion or moisturiser, which protect and enhance your home. While they make your home look better, they also do the most important job of looking after what is underneath them, so that your timber, concrete or plasterboard lasts so you don't have to replace it too soon. Though it can be tempting to leave surfaces natural, you're sacrificing them to the weather and everyday wear and tear without any protection. It's so much easier and cheaper to restain or repaint than to replace resource intensive surfaces that have failed early. With the huge range of Resene natural look finishes, you can easily protect the surface and make it easier to clean while keeping its natural good looks.

When you're thinking of replacing something, take a second look. Could you refresh it or reinvent it with paints and stains instead of sending it to the landfill? If you're choosing new hard-to-replace surfaces, remember you'll likely want to refresh them down the track, so choose options that are easy to paint or stain so you don't limit your future decorating choices.

Embrace the ocean's palette to lift your mood and energise your home.

The energising effects of water and in particular the sea are well known. Just take a stroll on the beach when your mind needs clearing and you'll find the fresh ocean air and waves will gently engage you with feelings of calm and ease.

Dive on in!

The restorative effect of water and sea have been documented for many years. A recent report from the Spanish city of Catalonia measured the healing powers of a coastal environment. The trial, called the 'Blue Prescription', followed 24 recovered cancer patients over a two year period. They discovered that these patients improved significantly both mentally and physically as a direct result of spending time near, or in, the ocean. "It's something that gives you a lot of endorphins, a lot of energy", explained participant, Maria Palou.

While we're not all lucky enough to have the ocean on our doorstep, we can create a similar uplifting effect in our homes with colour. The colour blue has long been known for its connection to freedom and inspiration. Choosing a beautiful blue as part of your overall palette will also add a rich level of depth and stability to your home.

Bringing nature indoors is a staple in our interior colour choices, with blues connecting a strong link to the ocean and the sky, reflecting a feeling of calm and serenity in your home. Whether you opt for a deep blue like Resene Madison or are drawn to the soft neutral tones of Resene Gull Grey, bringing the calming effects of the sky and sea into your home is but a paintbrush away!

Clever clashes

Clashing colours is a long-standing interior trend, but, Resene Colour Expert Amy Watkins says, just how to go about it can be somewhat daunting. "Creating a palette that works in bold tones in a bright and expressive manner is a great way to bring a sense of fun to your room. Bringing colour back into our environments is a trend gaining momentum as we embrace fun and revel in the delights colour offers," Amy says. The opportunity to inject a little fun in our homes has become more prevalent over the past year and we're seeing bold bright tones gain popularity in interior design."

A sense of frivolity is easy to create with colour clashing and, Amy says, following some simple guidelines will help you create both a stylish and fun space. When you're looking to colour clash, choose complementary colours – these sit opposite each other on the colour spectrum. Lean away from the primary tones to softer light tones for a bright space, or for a cosy room, lean into those muddier shades. "Aim for around three to five colours in your palette" says stylist Annick Larkin. Using a grounding darker colour and working in lighter shades or tones as accents will help create a harmonious yet fun room.

Colour block gallery

Colour blocks are a chic way to draw the eye to your artworks, Amy suggests. This is when you paint a block of colour behind the art piece on the wall. "This is a clever and simple way to enhance your artwork. These colour blocks create a gallery wall and talking point in your entrance or hallway," Amy says. When selecting the background block colour, ideally choose one of the least dominant colours within the artwork to use as your colour block. This allows the artwork itself to be the hero, but also have the colour work cleverly as its backdrop.

"If you don't have art but have treasured artefacts, you can use colour blocks as the background to highlight them. Opt for floating shelves in the same colour as the block itself and they'll disappear leaving your treasured items as the focus of your display."

When you are working with complementary colours, choose one as your feature and bring in the secondary colour in three to five places to allow each colour to have its own breathing space.



Where to draw the line

Whether you choose to go bold and make your frames and trims stand out or have them flow into the walls by treating them with the same colour, Amy says these areas are a great opportunity to add a snap of personality. Door jambs, window frames and trims are all fair game to bring a splash of colour to your home. "Bring the sunshine in by framing your windows in the bright citrus pop of Resene I Dare You. The key to making this trend work is to keep your walls neutral so the colour pops out just where you want it to." If you prefer a sophisticated pared back look, Amy suggests continuing your colour all the way from the ceiling to the walls and follow through to your trims. Using a Resene Enamacryl gloss finish on your trims will help the colour pop and make them stand out. **H**







Create your own wellness space that can quickly transform into a tranquil office.

n today's fast-paced world, finding moments of tranquillity and relaxation are essential for our overall well-being. While many of us seek solace in various wellness practices, such as meditation and yoga, creating a dedicated space in your own home enhances these experiences even further. Resene Colour Expert Amy Watkins says soft greens have long been associated with having a soothing effect on the mind and body, which makes them ideal for a yoga or meditation space at home. She suggests using shades reminiscent of nature, such as Resene Green Spring, Resene Saltpan and Resene Secrets, for a feeling of serenity in your wellness space that will make it easier for you to relax and unwind. As well as greens, warm, earthy tones work well in these calm spaces, Amy says. "Try terracotta beige tones such as Resene Summer Rose or the buttery notes of Resene Athena to create a relaxing environment."

Keep to low sheen and flat finishes, such as the Resene SpaceCote range, to allow your colours to recede. These sorts of finishes help to diffuse the light for a space that's easy to be in. When it comes to trims, use whites sparingly for these and selected accessories. This frames your colour without making the room feel too clinical. In addition to choosing the right colours and finish, it's important to maximise the functionality of your wellness space. While the primary purpose may be relaxation and rejuvenation, you can also use it as a versatile working space when you're not resting or stretching. Incorporating elements such as a comfortable chair, a small desk or a yoga mat, depending on your specific needs will help you seamlessly transition between work and relaxation, all within the same tranquil environment.

Use your calming colours not just on the walls but also on furniture and accessories, or even the floor and ceiling, Amy suggests. Try painting plant pots, shelving or your work desk in shades like Resene Paddock, Resene Half Rivergum or Resene Flax.

Pay attention to your lighting too. Natural light is ideal, as it boosts mood and energy levels. Position your space near a window to allow ample sunlight to fill the room. If natural light is limited, choose warm, soft lighting options that mimic the natural glow of the sun. When choosing your wall colour, remember that lighting affects the colour of the paint. If your space receives ample natural light, try a lighter, cooler green like Resene Envy or Resene Rainee. If your lighting is limited, try a warmer green like Resene Aspiring or Resene Coriander.

Creating a haven in your home doesn't have to be complicated or require a large budget. With a bit of creativity and DIY, you can transform even the smallest of spaces into a special retreat. H

n 2007, Michael and Amanda bought a home in Brisbane's Bridgeman Downs, ripped out the carpets, stripped the wallpaper and gave the walls a lick of paint.

Eighteen months later, they upped and moved to Sydney for a decade.

They returned with plans to sweep the home of an unfortunate 1970s legacy – mainly, a pokey kitchen ("it wasn't a joy to be in") and a dark and dysfunctional layout that put a massive walk-in pantry in the middle of the house.

But like many homes of that era, it had good bones; the architecture was interesting, the craftsmanship excellent and the materials top quality.

"The existing house had a real mix of things that were fantastic and terrible," says Jason Haigh, co-director of architectural practice Cloud Dwellers. The kitchen was a letdown, and the house flowed awkwardly. But lots of expressed timber gave the two-storey suburban home a "dominant characteristic of warmth, detailed scale and linear geometries".

Blue moods

Enter a kind of blue: Resene Bismark, to be exact. While paint wasn't the only tool used in the building's makeover, it was undoubtedly the most transformational. More than just a colour, Resene Bismark defines the home.

Says Jason: "It's common to hear people talk about 'restrained' colour palettes. But we believe a neutral material palette will generate a neutral reaction; how can you fall in love with a space if it makes you feel nothing?"

The brief was to renovate the home's ground floor, which contained all the common areas. Builders demolished the kitchen and surrounding internal walls, leaving the perimeter walls painted in Resene Triple Rice Cake to 'frame' the four new interconnected living spaces (dining, lounge, kitchen and play area). Cork flooring was removed and the slab polished. The project also unmasked a previously concealed staircase.

"The house is much more liveable now. The kitchen is the hub, so having it opened up, with the island facing the living areas, has transformed the house," says Michael. "Before, everyone felt isolated in different rooms. Now, the areas are combined." >

Opposite: Resene Bismark does double duty, accentuating the home's 1970s architecture and marking four new interconnected living spaces. "The warm colour of the original timber was such a strong element in the space," says Jason. "We balanced this by going to the opposite side of the colour wheel to get the ideal complementary colour. We explored many options, but this balance led Resene Bismark to win everyone over." The walls are painted in Resene Triple Rice Cake.

Colour and space

To interconnect the areas, Cloud Dwellers helped steer Amanda and Michael towards colour: the most impactful being Resene Bismark. The steely blue snakes through the living spaces and is used on an L-shaped cabinet to the side of the home's entry, on a timber room divider and throughout the kitchen. Custom pendants extend the concept beyond the main renovation area.

"Resene Bismark makes the space," says Michael. "Although renovated, the house has stayed true to its 1970s roots and has unlocked its potential. While the areas are new and modern, they could have been done 30 years ago. We didn't want a typical spec home; we wanted something with interesting features."

He says the new areas are brighter, better connected and have renewed the family's love of living there.

"The colour running through the frame and into the kitchen ties the areas together while allowing them to be separate. With so much wood in the house – with the beams and exposed wooden floorboards of the floor above – the blue helps to balance the colour of the timber.

The right hue

The choice of Resene Bismark was a collaboration. Recognising the importance of colour to help delineate spaces, Cloud Dwellers suggested an impressive 24 different options. Resene Bismark was the standout.

"It is an unusual colour for the house's interior," says Michael.

"Jason convinced us it would sit well with the pre-existing exposed beams and flooring. Cloud Dwellers did some 3D design mock-ups to help with the decision-making process. Throughout the process, Resene Bismark was our favourite."

Although Resene Bismark is the focal colour, other Resene hues also play their part. Resene Triple Rice Cake has an essential role. Restricted to the communal area's perimeter, it also helps to define the new spaces.

To enhance the strong geometry of the original timber structure, existing and new trims were painted with Resene Foundry, helping to "create a sense of juxtaposition at material junctions", says Jason. Resene paint wizards were also called upon to create a custom colour match to a laminate surface used on the cabinetry surrounds in the kitchen (for a similar colour try Resene Emerge). This was then used on doors and a pantry alcove as a consistent colour for shadowy background elements. The original wall cladding was painted in Resene Log Cabin. And the advantage of living with such an energetic hue? The colour dominates the space – in a good way – making it feel cohesive and happy, says Michael. **H**

Blues are a versatile colour that can change the whole look and feel of a space, says Resene Colour Expert Amy Watkins. Softer, greyed blues like Resene Breathless, Resene Duck Egg Blue, Resene Regent Grey, or Resene Shuttle Grey, can cool down a room and give it any airy feeling, Amy says. "Pairing them with shades from the opposite side of the colour wheel with warm offwhites like Resene Bianca will help maximise the breezy coastal feeling. To create a statement try pairing Resene Duck Egg Blue with an orange like Resene Kombucha."



Or if you are getting the cabinetry installed, ask the maker to use Resene AquaLAQ for a two-pack finish with extra durability. Ton Vu from Atlas Architects suggests this alternative scheme:

Incorporating soft curves, round shapes and an earthy, warm palette this design helps transform the room into a grounded, nurturing space for conversation and relaxation. By seamlessly wrapping the ceiling joists into the wall detailing, exposing these structural members starts to look like a deliberate design decision. These timber elements are finished with Resene Colorwood Whitewash elaborating the soft and natural aesthetic that this colour scheme entails. The banquette seating, hugged into the wall cavity, is presented in a red clay hue, which continues down to the floor, ultimately defining the focal point. Resene Sunbaked is used to centre the space and highlight the periphery elements such as the window and the dividers between rooms. These ultimately frame the views to both the exterior and interior respectively. By reducing the harsh linearity of the original design, the space is inviting and well suited to the residential family context it is held within.

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

For an uber natural, barely there look, use Resene Aquaclear Natural on walls and ceilings. This will protect the surface with a sheen that looks like bare timber.


Designers **Natalia** and **Kate** from Kanat Studio suggest this alternative scheme:


We love this home for its great open plan feel and original 1970s features. The space we have redesigned is a long and somewhat narrow thoroughfare, which needed to accommodate foot traffic. We chose to create a loose family space with the opportunity for kids and parents to break out together. We have opened up the sightline from the kitchen into the space by removing the open shelving. The steel columns are clad in timber finished in Resene Colorwood Walnut for continuity. Timber also features on the skirtings, architraves and new door joinery to bring in warmth, all stained in Resene Colorwood Walnut. The far wall is colourwashed in Resene Hampton and Resene Villa White, adding depth and layering to the interior space. Versatile seating options include the floor cushions allowing for floor play and the built-in bench seat for enjoying a morning coffee. The floor rug adds comfort underfoot or when laying down. Reds and blues contribute to the scheme by way of storage and accessories to keep the space feeling relaxed and casual.


reative application of colour not only adds visual flair to your interior, but it can also be used to turn mundane practical room features into lively talking points that add to the enjoyment of the space. The search for storage solutions is an ever-present challenge for most of us and with an innovative approach to colour, these essential additions can be elevated to something special and unique.

Uncover new space

One smart way to eke out extra storage space in different rooms is to make good use of your wall cavities. It's a technique often seen on a small scale in shower cubicles to allow shelving for shampoos and such-like. There's no reason why the same idea can't be deployed in kids' bedrooms, studies and kitchens.

Paint the lined interior of your cavity storage area in a bold contrast colour for dramatic impact. A vivid interior in Resene Thunderbird or Resene Retreat works particularly well in an otherwise monochrome interior of Resene Alabaster and Resene Nero. This contrast effect packs an even bigger surprise if hidden behind cupboard doors.

Resene Colour Expert Amy Watkins earmarks headboards as another opportunity to add both storage and colour. "Turn it into a feature using a colour like Resene Green Meets Blue and use a curved shape for added interest." Simplify the project by replicating a headboard and simply painting your curved shape directly on the wall behind your bed in your chosen colour. Or try an irregular shape in a dramatic wallpaper design like Resene Wallpaper Collection 38720-2. Add shelves in a matching paint shade like Resene Aspiring or a bold contrasting colour like Resene Sante Fe.

The trick to creative and eye-catching storage solutions is to find balance in your colour scheme and play with texture, says Resene Colour Expert Meryl Southey. "Choose colours and finishes which complement your overall scheme, creating interest but not taking away from any decorative elements."

If you're simply adding multiple bookshelves to a living space it might make sense to keep them the same colour as the walls, to give the illusion of space and prevent the shelves from dominating the room. Meryl suggests varying the sheen levels of your paint finishes using Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss or the Karen Walker Paints Chalk Colour paint and wax range, or add in textured Resene wallpapers for subtle impact.

If you have a feature decor piece in a beautiful colour on one shelf, look to repeat that colour in accent areas on the rest of your shelves in a painted vase or shelving brackets.

Ideas to try

Add a beautiful wallpaper, such as Resene Wallpaper Collection E307303, to one feature wall in your room, then repeat the pattern on wardrobe doors, drawer fronts or shelving to showcase those storage ideas, while making the whole space feel cohesive.

Wardrobes can be fun spaces to play with by adding contrast colours or wallpapers to the interior walls or shelves. If you can glimpse your wardrobe's interior from within the main room, think about how you can use colour for a seamless or unexpected visual effect.

If you have pale walls in the main room in a colour like Resene Duck Egg Blue, try something tonally similar but much darker inside the wardrobe like Resene Dark Slate. You could also try the opposite with darker room walls and a pale wardrobe interior, or let yourself go wild and use the wardrobe interior to use bold brights you might not want to use in larger spaces like Resene Wild Side or Resene Coconut Ice.

Adding large wooden hooks to the walls of your children's bedrooms is a useful way to reduce floor clutter from school bags and coats. Paint them in a spectrum of bright contrast colours. Large wooden boxes painted in your child's favourite colours or Resene FX Chalkboard Paint, which comes in a range of colours, adds both storage and seating space.

Meryl also recommends experimenting with Resene FX Paint Effects Medium to give shelves, dressers and cabinets a weathered or limewashed effect that works particularly well on upcycled pieces.

A mudroom can be a particularly useful storage area in your home, perfect for muddy shoes, umbrellas and wet coats. If you don't have the luxury of a mudroom, you can use a small area near your main entranceway, inside or out. Look for a large old wardrobe to refresh. Sand it back then paint or stain it in a stylish colour so it becomes a handy and elegant feature of your entranceway. If there's no room for a large cupboard, even a wooden bench with a shelf for shoes can make a difference and provide decorative opportunities.

Designing simple yet elegant storage solutions is a fun and easy way to create more space in your home. Even better, punctuate your storage with a pop of colour for a handy feature that is both pretty and practical. H

Get creative with your feature wall.

n eye-catching feature wall is a simple way to experiment with a bolder design aesthetic in your interiors, without having to go 'all in'.

If you want to go beyond a simple block colour on your feature wall, why not try a dramatic graphic pattern? The only limit is your imagination.

Simple geometric shapes like stripes, triangles, chevrons and parallelograms are easy to achieve if you're not confident in your freehand drawing. Mark out your design with a ruler and pencil, then mask off with painter's masking tape from your Resene ColorShop, before painting the edges, overlapping, flipping and adding highlights in contrast Resene colours. Even with these simple shapes, you can be creative in how you work them together.

If you have plain wooden, tiled or even concrete flooring you may want to continue elements of your design onto the floor or onto the ceiling. By going over these visual boundaries you'll give your design extra life and movement.

Interior designer Kate Alexander suggests keeping an eye on scale when you're adding a drawing or design to the wall. "Do some drawings on paper and Blu-Tack them to the wall to get the right scale. You can photocopy the design multiple times to give you a feel for how far it will reach on your wall," Kate says.

Going freehand

When it comes to a freehand design on the wall, Kate suggests starting in the least viewed areas first. "Often the drawing will get better as you go, so start low or in an area that won't be seen as much.

"If you don't feel confident draw the pattern on the wall in pencil first, especially if you want the graphic to reach a certain height or width, or relate to an item of furniture at a certain measurement."

If drawing is not for you, Kate suggests using a stencil, either by printing your own design or buying one online. "The trick to using a stencil is to have several copies, as it will start to fail after being moved and used multiple times.

"You could also make a print. Go old-school manual and cut a potato," she says. "The trick with prints is to make sure you get the right amount of paint each time. Paint the paint onto the potato so it's even and not gloopy."

Consider your colours

When choosing a colour palette for your graphic design think about what visual effect you want to create and how it will work with the rest of the space.

To keep the feature from overwhelming everything else, a palette of three Resene colours is a good place to start. Keep things pared back with a black and white base with shades like Resene Alabaster and Resene Nero with either a fresh splash of Resene Hypnotic or a muted blue like Resene Biscay.

This dark/light combination with a highlight colour can also work well to create a 3D effect in repeat geometric patterns, using darker blacks and greys like Resene Condor and Resene Possessed as a shadow to whites and brighter contrast colours.

For a more soothing finish, a tonal palette can work well to draw attention to your design while keeping the finish understated and almost neutral. Choose a selection of similar colours from one Resene palette card to create a tone-on-tone effect. Or if you'd like to try an ombre fade effect, try graduated sunset shades like Resene Tequila, Resene Just Right and Resene Cashmere. H

Play with your paint's gloss level to add subtle touches of contrast. You can do this by using a higher sheen paint, such as Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss or Resene Enamacryl gloss, or use a Resene clear finish, such as Resene Concrete Clear in flat, satin or gloss, over your paint colour to adjust its sheen level. When Atlas Architects Aaron Neighbour and Ton Vu first took on a project in Arthurs Seat, Victoria, the home had its back turned on the fabulous views. They knew they had their work cut out to re-align the property and centre the view over the beautiful Mornington Peninsula for the homeowners.

"Our key driver for this home was to blur the

line between old and new, simplicity and complexity. The colour palette we chose was dark and cosy with calm greys, charcoals and bluestone. It limits light reflection, creating less strain on the eyes and elevating the expansive windows, views and natural light", says Ton. The effect is a home that offers seclusion where desired while also feeling expansive in areas.

The exterior brick walls were painted in the deep charcoal of Resene Bokara Grey, using Resene CoolColour technology, to help protect the home's cladding and keep the temperature down in hot weather.

"The dark tone-on-tone exterior colours and



pergola elements simplify the appearance of the building to a contemporary silhouette of a pitch roof farmhouse. This creates a contrast for the green and purple hue of the landscape to come forward."

The home itself was a 1980s brick pitched-roof farmhouse that the homeowners wanted to upgrade, while celebrating the natural outlook surrounding the property. They also wanted to take advantage of the access to the outdoors and create areas that celebrated connection and shared experiences.

"The existing roofline was messy so we evolved it by creating a steel fascia pergola structure that envelops the existing building so it still reads as one solid line. It extends the roofline and shelters the open space at the entrance, creating a private northern courtyard. Over time, the plants at its base will grow, creeping up to the roofline and enhancing the home's privacy with flora so it feels contained but never confined."

Selecting exterior colours from Resene that allow the landscape to shine have made this home a standout that honours the surrounding Mornington Peninsula. This home frames the surrounding landscape from every angle while discreetly nestling into its surrounding environment.

Traditional restoration

Owner Barb Lawson took on the restoration of her beautiful villa in Nelson with an open mind. Understanding that this home was a heritage property offered its own set of challenges. While the home had had paint colour changes in the past, they weren't always in keeping with the home's heritage style. "The home is over a century old, but had been 'modernised' in the 70s-80s. It was a cacophony of colours, styles and textures."

Tackling the project head on, Barb initially looked at her exterior colours. Selecting the soft green grey tone of Resene Half Inside Back successfully bridged the gap to offer a nod to the home's heritage while also bringing a modern feel to the exterior. Window surrounds were painted in the lighter pearl grey of Resene Geyser, allowing the trims and architraves to stand out with Resene Black White.

The overall feel is a home that has been both modernised and brightened, while staying true to its traditional style. When Barb first bought the home there was much needed to restore her new home to its previous glory. "It felt very dark and small. The overall aim was to 'spruce the old girl up' bringing back her original charm."

top tip

Different sheen levels will impact how your colour looks and performs. A higher sheen finish, such as Resene Hi-Glo, is usually easier to clean but is less sympathetic to older buildings. A lower sheen finish, such as Resene Lumbersider Low Sheen, will help hide imperfections and marks but is usually harder to clean. To balance the benefits of both higher and lower sheen, try Resene Sonyx 101 semi-gloss waterborne enamel – it's not as shiny as a gloss finish, but is easier to clean than a lower sheen finish.

top it off

When you're decorating, it's best to work from the top down. Refresh your roof or give it a whole new colour look with Resene Summit Roof Semi-Gloss. If you have a steep roof, choose a mid-range colour to reduce glare. Roof colours tend to look much lighter once you paint them on because of the bright sunlight. If you are choosing between two roof colours, it's often best to pick the darker one as it will look lighter in the sun.

Painting your fence to get it summer ready need not be a tiresome task. Our Tradie Gal Tegan Williams walks you through the steps to get a professional finish on your fence.

hen tackling a job like painting your fence, take the time to consider the surrounding colours as these will be part of your palette. Using a rich dark colour like Resene Bokara Grey or Resene Nocturnal offers a wonderful depth to allow your green foliage or favourite florals to take centre stage.

If you have chosen a light tone for your home's exterior, you can mirror this on your fence. If you're using Resene Lumbersider Low Sheen or Resene Lumbersider Matt, you can use the exact same paint on your weatherboards and fence. Or you could go a little darker on your fence, perhaps a double or triple strength of your wall colour, to help hide marks and reduce glare.

The Resene Whites & Neutrals collection has up to six strengths of the most popular colours to make it easy to choose lighter or darker options.

You will need:

- Paint tray
- Resene #15 roller kit and extension pole
- Paintbrush for cutting in
- Resene Lumbersider Low Sheen tinted to your chosen colour, Tegan used Resene Bokara Grey

Tradie Gal's steps for success:

Prep first: Always wash your fence before you paint. Treat moss and mould with Resene Moss & Mould Killer, then wash with Resene Timber and Deck Wash.

Step 1: Pour out what you need from your paint pot into your roller tray if rolling or into a Resene paint pot if you are brushing it on. This helps to keep the paint in the main container fresh so it lasts longer.

Step 2: Starting from the bottom of your fence, cut in with your paintbrush along the entire base so that when you start working with your roller it won't pick up any debris off the ground.

Step 3: Check out any edges that are prominent and cut these in as well, especially if your fence isn't straight like mine! Doing this will save you time in the long run.

Step 4: A Resene #15 roller sleeve is designed especially for areas like fences and makes applying the paint easy. Use an up and down motion and work your way methodically along the fence line following the direction of the wood grain.

Step 5: Always start and finish on the side of a panel to avoid any fast drying lines showing up in your work. Add Resene Hot Weather Additive if you need to slow the drying down in hot weather.

Step 6: Keep working with your roller from one side to the other. This is always best for continuity in your paint finish. Make sure you always roll the full panel and check to make sure you have fully coated the panel before moving onto the next. When painting your fence, apply one primer coat and two topcoats, or three topcoats If you are using a self-priming finish like Resene Lumbersider Low Sheen, for the best long-lasting finish.

When choosing paint for your exterior fence, Resene Lumbersider Low Sheen is a great option as it's self-priming, so you can use the same paint for all coats. I've chosen the gorgeous dark shade of Resene Bokara Grey to offset the greenery of my lawn and foliage.

Choosing to use Resene Bokara Grey in the CoolColour version means that the fence stays cooler in the sun. For the best CoolColour effect, apply a coat of Resene Quick Dry first.

old colour palettes and artistic flair have revived two different poolside retreats. In the realm of design, the fusion of past concepts and modern functionality often results in exceptional creations. This recent project by Hungerford + Edmunds (www.hungerfordedmunds.com) involved careful alterations and additions to a cherished mid-century home, originally designed by architect Keith Cottier of Allen Jack+Cottier in 1965. Distinctive for its Sydney School style, this home's outdoor space is a high point of its transformation, integrating a newly decorated pool while preserving the charming character. Embracing the essence of its original architecture, designer Belinda Edmunds has restored and enhanced this home, giving it new life while paying homage to its historical significance.

"The clients loved the mid-century style and robust finishes of the house," Belinda says. "The objective was to seamlessly connect the residence with a newly designed pool area and create entertainment areas that effortlessly blend with the outdoor ambiance."

The project's design approach was heavily influenced by iconic black and white photographs taken by photographer David Moore in 1966. These images, featured in the book Living & Partly Living: Housing in Australia, showcased the home amidst towering gum trees, its crisp white composition accentuated by contrasting roof trim. These visual cues informed the new design, as well as the chosen Resene colour palette.

The colour palette was carefully curated to honour the past while embracing the present. Inspired by the timeless photographs, the exterior was repainted in Resene Quarter Thorndon Cream, with the roof's distinctive edging highlighted in Resene Dynamite, a deep blue tinged red. This bold choice connects the various architectural elements, creating a vibrant visual cohesion.

Belinda collaborated with Resene Colour Expert Natalie Tennant to bring this mid-century vision to life. Natalie's expertise ensured that existing and new substrates received the appropriate paint finishes, such as Resene Sonyx 101 semi-gloss on external trims and columns, for best protection.

Resene Bokara Grey, a deep charcoal black, was used on external balcony columns and vertical balustrade timber, while a slightly browner shade of Resene Triple Masala was used for all external trims, working to frame and enhance each space and angle.

Resene Lumbersider Low Sheen was used for the vibrant abstract pool mural tinted to Resene Dynamite, Resene Retro, Resene Half Resolution Blue, Resene Dauntless, Resene Spotlight, Resene Adrenalin and Resene Eighth Masala.

A defining feature of the outdoor design is the geometric roof, which Belinda describes as "a simple geometric element that connects the new work both visually and physically." This roof elegantly ties together different spaces. It functions as a covered walkway, linking the kitchen to the rumpus and cabana, wrapping around the pool edge. The new low-level roof reorients the home toward the pool and eastern courtyard, creating a sense of unity and harmony throughout the space. Showing a commitment to honouring architectural heritage and celebration of history, this transformed residence is not only a home but a timeless work of art.

Poolside artistry

At Veil House, an inner-city Melbourne gem crafted by Wolveridge Architects (www.wolveridge.com.au) and McKerlie Builders (www.mckerliebuilders.com.au), the pool area is more than just a space – it's a canvas.

Seeking to bridge the gap between interior and exterior, a captivating mural was envisioned to transform a functional cinder block wall into a mesmerising focal point. This masterpiece, designed by Gnashingteeth, seamlessly intertwines geometric shapes with the abiding presence of a pair of doves that have witnessed the property's journey since its inception. Vibrant bursts of Resene colour echo the interior palette while shades of grey harmoniously ground the composition.

Conceived over sun-drenched days, this artwork beckons guests to unwind by the pool, cocktail in hand - showing that with a little imagination, a simple cinder block wall can be transformed into something modern and artistic.



hen Matt Peacock created Tides Out Maps, he was creating a business from a deep love of the ocean. "I loved being in the water when I was young, and more recently discovered scuba diving, kayaking and spearfishing. The more time I spent exploring our beautiful coastline the more my appreciation grew."

Combining an engineering background and a fascination with our waters, Matt started crafting these beautiful maps, reflecting the local coastline in a multitude of beautiful Resene blues, ranging from the light and bright Resene Sail through to the depths of Resene Space Cadet.

The idea for the maps was inspired by a company creating wood charts for some of the Great Lakes in the USA. "I was lucky enough to have access to a laser cutter through work so started experimenting with my own designs." The first map Matt made was of his local - Waihi Beach. "It was about the size of my hand and was shaded using blue colouring pencils. We've grown a lot since then!"

The process has evolved since those early days where it could take months for Matt to complete a single design. "I've become a lot more efficient since then, developing systems to streamline the process, however the method is still inherently manual."

Matt's process starts with understanding his customer's vision for their map. "Once I've got the location, I'll import the appropriate dataset into a GIS mapping software program. The time-consuming part is converting the raw data into layered files that I send to our laser cutter."

Matt starts each build by using a small roller to apply two coats of a predetermined selection of Resene paints to sheets of MDF wood. "I'll apply a shade of blue that corresponds to the appropriate depth of the ocean."

Large sheets of masking tape are applied to the painted wood to ensure the heat from the laser doesn't cause the paint to burn. Once each sheet has been cut using the laser machine, Matt then stacks and glues the layers into the finished product.

Tides Out Maps' inception started when Matt was experimenting with laser cutting his maps around five years ago, though the business became official two years ago. "Since then, as well as making local coastline maps, we've made international maps including Fiji, Samoa, Switzerland, France and Canada. We'd love to one day expand our range even further internationally."

Matt's maps often have a very personal touch to them. He says these are his favourite part of the job. "I always try to learn about the connection our customers have to the location of their map and the answer is usually fascinating! Often it's a crazy adventure, like the couple who sailed their tiny lasers from Auckland to Paihia. Other times it's a deep connection to a place, like a map of the Cook Strait

Heritage renaissance

nterior designer and property expert Jessica Driver and her husband Thomas Ward are experienced hands at house renovations, but even so, the makeover of what was then their home in Kingsland, Auckland, was a huge project.

The couple, who own their own property business I Am Developer, bought the original villa mid-lockdown. Having been a rental for many years it was in a fairly sorry state. "Think Dunedin student flat but worse," Jessica says.

Undaunted, the couple took on a major makeover, at the centre of which was a fully redesigned kitchen, extended to include a new walk-in scullery and laundry and connected to a beautiful open-plan living area. The spaces are divided by a stunning modern fireplace, the feature of which is a curved finish, designed to mirror the shape of the bespoke kitchen island.

"We opted for different shades of white and cream that would allow the heritage panelling and features to be the main focus and stand out. Old villas tend to be dark and cold and we wanted to eradicate that and give it a modern makeover that ties in with the new extension."

The same colour scheme is used throughout most of the home's interior.

"The warmer Resene paint colours bring out the richness of the wooden flooring. The clean whites accentuate the high ceilings and create a spacious tranguillity."

As well as keeping the kitchen light and bright the mix of cool and warm neutrals honours the home's history, Jessica says.

The commitment to a cohesive look is a defining feature of the finished kitchen renovation. Jessica and Thomas laboured over each element of the kitchen to ensure it not only satisfied their vision for the finished kitchen but worked well with their design choices throughout the open living areas. Colours in the island benchtop influenced wall colours, flecks of grey in the stone base of the fireplace influenced the colour of the kitchen island and the marble splashback.

Jessica says the vision started with the quartz island benchtop and went out from there. "We chose the stone first. We knew which one we wanted so we took photos of it and started modelling up the kitchen we wanted."

The couple worked closely with friend and cabinetmaker Matt Taine of Rabbet Design who added his expertise on what was possible before making all the kitchen cabinetry, including the centrepiece kitchen island, which features an elegant curved end in both the marble and the fluted wooden panelling painted in Resene Gull Grev.

Jessica says the island was one of the biggest challenges of the kitchen, but also one of the most rewarding aspects of the finished design.

"It was a balancing act getting all the elements working together; creating that curve, then adding the fluted panelling and the stone,

but I think we really pulled it off." Another key part of the original vision for the kitchen was to have the cabinets running almost floor to ceiling but with an original stud height of 3.4m that was a big ask. To solve that problem the couple opted to drop the ceiling

height. That allowed the cabinets to not only almost run to ceiling height and still be usable, but they were also able to add in a practical overhead storage cavity, all while satisfying their goal of clean, even lines through the whole space.

The scullery door is tall and thin to match the cabinet shapes, and the main kitchen is clear of bulky appliances, with just a wall oven and cooktop visible. "We knew we wanted a big double fridge, but that went into the scullery. Instead, there's a small bar fridge in the kitchen island for the practical things, along with the dishwasher."

"We moved our family into the house partway through the renovation," Jessica says. "We'd just had our second daughter, who was a month old, and we had a three-year-old. We went through all the lockdowns with no kitchen, lounge or dining. It was trving times!"

And though the couple have renovated other properties for clients there was a difference when it came to tackling their own home.

"You have more ownership, and I think you can be more creative and push the boundaries a bit further when it's your own place," Jessica says, adding that there is a unique satisfaction knowing that their efforts are now being enjoyed by new owners.

"It was an absolute labour of love, and we feel very proud of the journey this property took us on. We turned it into a warm luxurious home and restored its heritage." H

bold revival

love of colour and fun was at the heart of the design brief given to architect Mona Kruse Hurnen when the homeowners of this beautiful Arts and Crafts house in Wellington's Hataitai were preparing to give it a makeover.

When Rachel and Tanya bought the house, it was still almost all original, complete with a Shacklock stove installed in 1910. Though the matai, rimu and totara bones of the building were strong, it was in need of some love.

"For a small kitchen it functioned well with a wee breakfast bar," Rachel says. "The original wood-fired oven was still in place, although the chimney had gone."

Beyond retaining some of the original features, Rachel and Tanya's brief to Mona was to create a country-style kitchen with an open-plan layout that catered to their love of both cooking and entertaining.

There was also a clear directive to be bold and for "each room to be a standalone colour, while still reading together as a colourful whole", Mona says. In the finished kitchen that desire for colour has been expressed with the use of elegant grey-blue Resene Artemis on the cabinetry above the range and around the windows. It makes for a beautiful accent against fresh Resene White Pointer painted on the remaining walls and Resene Half White Pointer on the ceiling. All timber features have been removed, carefully labelled, restored and reinstalled alongside the new colour scheme as part of the renovation.

"We love colour calling out from classic styling," Rachel says. The choice of Resene Artemis was influenced by how it worked in with the colour palette of the rest of the home, as well as the colour of the splashback tiles. This lovely stone colour on the cupboards is timeless.

Her biggest challenge of the project was embracing colours and getting the balance right between the original features, look and feel of the house and inserting more modern elements. The highlight was "seeing it all come together on site after many months of planning", Mona says.

Another standout aspect of the kitchen is the personality that's come from including Rachel and Tanya's collection of personal items, which was another part of the design brief to Mona. "They wanted to create something to house their eclectic collections from many years of renovating houses and living in many different locations. The end result is a colour 'hello' to the world on the outside and to all visitors on entering. Both like eclecticism with modern and traditional furniture; a comfortable home that some would call maximalist."

Rachel agrees this is an important part of her and Tanya's combined design aesthetic.

Reflecting your own tastes rather than imagining what some future owner might like is an important part of a successful kitchen renovation like this, Mona says. "Make it for yourself, not for resale. Your home is where you spend a lot of time, and it should be for you and what you enjoy. Do not be afraid of some more bold elements."

Rachel says working with Mona elevated her and Tanya's vision for the kitchen and the house as a whole. "She made it even better. The views from the sitting room are now a comfortable part of the openplan living area and the integration of the pantry is amazing."

Though part-way through the renovation project, Rachel and Tanya worried the kitchen was too big, they now love the scope of the space and the opportunities it affords for entertaining and welcoming all of their six children when they come home.

"We also had an amazing kitchen joiner whose experience and working relationship with the architect has meant excellent attention to detail, like the location of everything, including the extra storage for preserves above the stove. No space is wasted and we pinch ourselves every day.


"We can gather our family easily. We host large dinner parties and we often have multiple family members cooking. It is beautiful." H

e all love a home that maximises comfort and style, but why not add green values at its heart too?

With that in mind, have you considered cork? Durable enough to sustain the pitter-patter of a busy household, cork is cushioned underfoot and also adds visual texture and warmth. Cork is derived from oak trees with a lifespan of 200 years. The tree is not cut down to access the cork as the bark can be removed by hand from the outer layer every nine years. The tree will continue to grow healthily after the bark is harvested.

If you want to use cork on the floor and leave it a natural colour, Ashleigh Strange from Resene's advice team suggests simply coating the cork with four coats of Resene Qristal ClearFloor 1K, an Eco Choice approved finish. "This will provide protection as the varnish will form a surface, also meaning the surface can be easily wiped and cleaned."

You can also use Resene Colorwood stains on cork or washes like Resene Colorwood Whitewash. These will tint the cork to your chosen shade but still allow some texture to show through. "Just remember cork can soak up a lot of stain, so you might get a darker colour. It's always best to test first before doing your whole floor," Ashleigh says. For painted cork tiles on a floor, Ashleigh recommends priming first with Resene Quick Dry, followed by two coats of Resene Walk-on in your chosen colour. Finish with Resene Concrete Wax to seal. "Resene Concrete Wax is a tough waterborne satin glaze. Scratches are easily repaired," she says. "The top tip for a long-lasting cork floor is to make sure you have a durable coating and don't allow water to pool on the surface for a long period of time."

When it comes to colour and design for your cork floor, take your cue from a chair or bookshelf and extend that colour on to the floor. For just a touch of colour paint a 3cm perimeter line back from where the floor meets the wall. Another fun approach is to lean into the cork tile square shape and paint a checkerboard design. Try mid-toned brown Resene Americano with soft Resene Cashmere, alternating diagonally from board to board. Of course, cork needn't be restricted to floors. Create a handy wall organiser, painted in fun designs that match your surrounding palette. Resene colour testpots are ideal for this job. **H**

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

An interior designer with a love of animals and a master's in art curates a beautiful palette of Resene Whites & Neutrals to turn a rambling rural property into a sophisticated home. Imost a decade ago, with a young family and a dream of living in the country, interior designer Danielle Francis drove up the beautiful tree-lined driveway of her soon-to-be home in Auckland's Karaka.

At nearly nine hectares, the scale of the enchanting property – with its rolling pastures and park-like feel – was huge. Danielle knew that to realise her long-held vision of a beautiful home surrounded by children, horses and dogs, she would need to balance caring for her family with projectmanaging a large-scale renovation and rebuild.

As an interior designer, Danielle creates homes that are not just about beautiful aesthetics. She believes spaces must tell a story that reflect her clients' lives and, importantly, meet their practical needs. The same ethos was at the heart of the designs for her own home.

When she took on the project in Karaka, she knew it would be a labour of love. The grounds captivated her, and she wanted a home to reflect their beauty and sit cohesively >

in the landscape. The first step was overhauling the rundown cottage, the property's original living quarters.

"The property had this quite lovely little cottage, but it was not substantive enough to suit the needs of our growing family. I wanted to create an extension that looked like it had always been there. Along with SGA architect Pat de Pont, I worked with local architect Bruce MacKenzie to design a barn to house a master wing, walk-in wardrobes, study, laundry and internal garaging. We needed to create a new entrance and a new driveway. I was drawn to those classic American barns in Virginia, and we used several features to recreate that aesthetic."


Starting from the ground up, Danielle chose a Turkish travertine floor for the new extension and entrance. The flooring has a wonderful grey and deep licorice marbly grain, offering three shades to help her create the palette for the exterior paint colours. She selected beautiful, muted tones of Resene Ash for the barn's exterior walls, with window trims in Resene Double Masala, frames in Resene Triple Friar Greystone and the roof in Resene Ironsand. The cottage exterior is painted in Resene Double Rice Cake with shutters in Resene Double Ash. "The build had to be very practical, and I chose materials that could handle a plethora of muddy feet and children. My children come in soaked through after riding and washing horses or playing outside in the fields."

When choosing paints for the home's interior, Danielle embraced more of the beautiful colours in Resene's Whites & Neutrals range, building her palette from a base of Resene Half Ash on the main bedroom's walls, with trims and ceiling in Resene Rice Cake. She favoured Resene's SpaceCote Low Sheen finish because it allowed the relaxed tones to be diffused beautifully while being easy to clean.

Soft neutrals were also chosen for the lounge and bedrooms, with Danielle building on the same palette to complement her furniture and paintings. Her use of crisp linens and natural fabrics in pared-back colours allows the family's stunning artwork and sculptures to shine.

Mangrove. The crisp white ceiling is painted in the practical finish of Resene SpaceCote in Resene Rice Cake for easy wiping.

This stunning home – taking two and half years to complete, thanks to the pandemic – is now a wonderful retreat from the hustle and bustle of Danielle's busy design business, Danielle Francis Ltd (Instagram @daniellefrancis_interiors).

But interior design isn't Danielle's only talent. Danielle has a background in art, studying contemporary art in Australia, followed by a master's degree. She landed jobs with auction houses Sotheby's and Christie's and did a stint at London's Serpentine Gallery. "It was a real education in art and style. It exposed me to the very sophisticated world of interiors and I met some incredible collectors and designers – in London, especially."

She loves extending her clients' ideas and challenging their perceptions to create a cohesive aesthetic direction that properly reflects them. "Once we have agreed on an overall palette and the tone of the interior, I begin to work with specific colours on-site and start collecting interior pieces and curating or renovating existing furnishings. Ultimately, I am looking to merge their lifestyle and history into a deeply personal expression of themselves."

Danielle is embracing the shift from minimalist monochromatic exteriors to more subtle earthy shades as her business grows. "These days, interiors are getting more nuanced. We're seeing braver use of richly coloured stone and textural wallcoverings. So many of us work in sterile corporate environments. It's wonderful when your home can offer a rich and warm contrast to relax in."

Though Danielle now enjoys working with her clients to create their personal stories, she loved working on her own family home, with unlimited time allowing the process to evolve more intuitively. "It keeps changing, and it's my place to experiment and develop my visual vernacular. The house is continually changing with us." **H**



Selecting a new colour scheme for the exterior of your home is guite different to selecting a new colour scheme for the interior. Not only is it a larger area to paint but there are often multiple substrates and fixtures to think about. Repetition is key to keeping a scheme in balance and in this instance Resene Double Black White is applied to multiple substrates. Pergolas are a great way to frame and create an outdoor living space. Create ambience by hanging festoon lights, lighting candles and layering pots and planters. Quick ideas to refresh and revive your bathroom.

B athrooms are places of both retreat and high function. We want them to be visually inviting and pleasing places to be in, but they're also high-use wet-zone spaces subject to plenty of wear and tear.

The good news is bathrooms are perfect for simple, often quick, projects offering high rewards for minimal effort (and expense).

Whimsical touches

Interior designer Megan Harrison-Turner is a fan of painting murals on bathrooms on one wall or as a frieze near the ceiling. It doesn't need to cover the entire space. Instead, Megan suggests painting tendrils of wisteria and vines cascading down from one corner using Resene Poet, Resene Summer Green and Resene Laurel. "Add a couple of hot air balloons with your children's names on them and some clouds against a pale blue wall in Resene Half Spindle or Resene Comfort Zone. A freehand mountain vista also makes an impact but is also really easy to execute," she says.





If you're unsure about your drawing abilities, try something geometric like a Mondrian design using block primary colours against white and black, Megan suggests.

Feast for the eyes

If you're a fan of long soaks in the bath, consider painting your ceiling in an unexpected colour as a feast for your eyes when you're lying back relaxing. Try a block shade in a bright cheerful hue like Resene Tequila Sunrise or go for a more soothing look in muted Resene Soiree. Go further if it takes your fancy by painting bold stripes or even a geometric design.

Refresh and revive

Stencilling over tired wall tiles that are 200 x 200mm or 300 x 300mm is a quick and easy update.

Megan recommends using stencils, "make your own or buy online, and use a limited colour palette of just two or three Resene colours – this works splendidly well. I've used sealer then Resene Lustacryl with really good results," she says.

Sanding back a tired wooden floor is another way to add some flair back to a bathroom or toilet. Go for a bold colour, or even use a stencil to map out a faux-tile finish. Paint your whole floor in a light background colour, then, when dry, stencil your pattern in a darker shade over the top. Try a mix of bold blues like Resene Madison and Resene Skylight or go for layered neutrals with Resene Triple Akaroa and Resene Half Akaroa. A classic black and white check pattern in Resene White and Resene Black is another simple-to-execute look. Paint your whole floor in white then pencil out your black squares before painting them. Use low-tack masking tape for crisp lines and remove it just before the paint is fully dry. Or for a lightly washed look, apply Resene Colorwood Whitewash or a colourwash stain from the Resene We Speak Beach collection.

Use an accent pattern

A dramatic mural-style wallpaper like Resene Wallpaper Collection E307401 will immediately lend a touch of classic style to your bathroom. Take that same wallpaper pattern or a similar one, such as Resene Wallpaper Collection E307301, and add it to other accent areas of your bathroom such as panels, wall shelves or cupboard door fronts. Pick out a colour from the wallpaper to use for your Resene paint colour on adjacent walls.

Go all in

A small ensuite bathroom or separate toilet is the perfect space to embrace a full-on ornate wallpaper pattern on all four walls for an elaborate look that celebrates a small space. Try the tropical botanical vibes of Resene Wallpaper Collection 38738-3 or the florals of Resene Wallpaper Collection 295145. Finish the space with a large mirror with a frame painted in Resene Gold metallic and a gold lightshade or shimmering chandelier for some light-hearted bling.



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



When the integration of the imagination, one roll of Resene wallpaper can add touches of colour and design throughout your home, from artworks to table runners or to refresh furniture or the inside of your drawers. It's an easy way to get started and grow in confidence using wallpaper, then expand to bigger features and rooms.

Step 1: Find your perfect match

Selecting the perfect wallpaper to serve as your canvas is as easy as wandering through an art gallery. Opt for a design that speaks to your style and décor. Whether you prefer daring and vibrant patterns or something more subtle and classic, the choices are endless. Don't be afraid to mix and match different finishes and colours to create an eclectic and visually engaging look. We teamed the abstract confidence of Resene Wallpaper Collection 409253 with a pretty floral pattern Resene Wallpaper Collection 464900. The unifying factor isn't pattern but colour and tone.

There are very few limits. Small, repetitive designs will look great if teamed with largerscale patterns; modern abstracts can be amazing paired with traditional botanical prints. Bold goes great with soft; detailed can pair beautifully with subtle. Let your imagination go for it.

Step 2: Frame it up

Once you have your wallpaper, it's time to find the frame to showcase it. Look for sturdy frames that complement the size and style of your patterns. Experiment with frames with unique shapes and textures to add an extra layer of visual interest. Consider mixing and matching styles to create a dynamic gallery wall if you have multiple wallpaper options.

Step 3: Go big

Another dramatic way to present Resene wallpaper is to split the pattern across two or three frames. Known as a diptych or triptych, this creates an attractive, sequenced appearance for larger pieces. Resene Wallpaper Collection 687408 has a bold, gloriously oversized pattern ideal for sectioning. Side by side, two or three framed panels look fantastic in a bright, light-filled conservatory or open-plan kitchen.

Step 4: Colour complementary

Painting your frames instantly adds an extra dimension. Pick a colour that exists in your wallpaper artwork and in your existing décor. We chose Resene Teak, a tea-like brown that worked colour wise with the hues in both wallpapers and the yellow Resene Moonbeam stripe on the wall. But we could equally have chosen a smoky midblue with a hint of green such as Resene Green Meets Blue. We primed the frames with Resene Quick Dry waterborne primer undercoat.

Step 5: Getting stuck in

Wallpaper can either be framed behind glass (like a conventional art print), mounted on a piece of artboard or stuck on a canvas. Glass provides a more traditional look, while mounting is slightly more contemporary. Both approaches suit a painted frame. We chose to give our wallpaper artworks a slightly more timeless look with an art mat.

Step 6: Artful arrangement

Now comes the fun part – arranging your customised artworks. Before hammering nails, lay them out on the floor or a large table to experiment with different arrangements. Use a symmetrical layout for a balanced and harmonious feel or embrace asymmetry for a more playful look. Remember to leave enough space between each frame to avoid clutter and allow each piece to shine. Use a level to make sure your artwork is hanging straight.

Sparkling options

Another option when painting frames is to use a Resene FX Metallic paint or special effects finish. A glittering array is on offer – from the gorgeous Resene Bullion (a soft copper) to Resene Magnetic (a sparkly mid-silver) and Resene Gold. See the Resene Metallics and special effects range for some ideas to get you started. **H**

eutral colours are perennial favourites with versatile monochrome shades like Resene Merino and Resene Grey Friars often appearing in the top 20 list of most popular shades.

However, our collective taste in neutrals is evolving, and our confidence in colour is growing too. Today's new neutral trend goes beyond monochrome palettes to warmer, deeper shades that add colour and flair while keeping the versatility, style and sophistication we love about neutrals. Think dusky reds like Resene Coral Tree, muted ochres such as Resene Double Sisal, soft greens like Resene Pumice and yellow oxides such as Resene Tussock.

Whether you're adding notes of a coloured neutral to an otherwise grey, white or cream colour palette, or going all-in with layers of analogous shades, these bolder neutrals can be a 'safe' way to begin experimenting with a touch of colour in your home.

Adding bolder neutrals to your palette brings the simple benefit of making spaces more inviting, says Resene Colour Expert Jackie Nicholls. "Choosing neutrals with more depth to them can make a massive difference to the feeling of a space. More complex neutrals have interesting undertones that can help pull a scheme together.

"If you're drawn to soft furnishings with a green slant for example, they will nestle best against neutrals with a similar undertone such as Resene Quarter Parchment. If you have dusky pinks, tan and chocolate-coloured furnishings, something like Resene Quarter Akaroa, with a taupe undertone, helps pull them all together.

"Always look at your Resene paint colours with your furnishings, flooring and accents to see how they work together."

Jackie says bolder neutrals have a complexity and softness that can lend a room a more 'high-end' finish, and will often recede from the eye, making them ideal for smaller spaces or as a backdrop that allows key decor pieces to shine.

She suggests painting A2 sheets of card (leaving a 2cm wide unpainted border) with Resene testpots in

different bolder neutral shades. Place them behind a favourite piece of furniture or artwork to see what really makes it pop. "More often than not, a deeper colour will create the best effect," she says.

Get the best from bold neutrals

Paying attention to the undertones of any other traditional neutrals you're using in your space will help you narrow down which bolder neutral colours to try, says Resene Colour Expert Meryl Southey. Each Resene colour has a code starting with an R (red), O (orange), Y (yellow), G (green), B (blue), V (violet), BR (brown) or N (neutral) to help with this.

"Look to see if your traditional neutrals have hints of pink, green or yellow, for example. Noticing these variations allows you to play off that undertone with the other colours you layer on top. Try neighbouring colours on the Resene colour palette cards which have similar undertones but aren't exactly the same variation of that neutral - this creates a more interesting palette," Meryl says.

"Any colour can be subdued and appear neutral when combined with the basics such as greige. white or beige, and spreading the colour throughout the space with varying strengths, reduces the impact of a bolder colour, while still creating interest."

If you want to create a monochrome effect with coloured neutrals, look to add visual interest with the use of texture, pattern and colour through Resene wallpapers, wood stains or paint effect finishes, Meryl suggests. And consider using your bolder colours in less expected places like the >

floor and ceiling, paired with wallpapers or painted walls in more traditional neutrals, to make a bold statement.

When combining different coloured neutrals, interior designer Megan Harrison-Turner says it's best to keep to a similar colour profile or saturation.

If you're opting for a muddy pink like Resene Cashmere, keep any other colours equally muddy or greyed off. Try pairing muted pink with smokier greens like Resene Staccato or greyed blues like Resene Duck Egg Blue, she says. "Putting a sharp clear shade next to a subtle, sophisticated 'muddy' colour is an instant colour killer."

Colour combinations to try

Jackie suggests trying dusky or muddied pinks like Resene Wafer or Resene Martini with leathery browns or soft caramels such as Resene Cashmere and Resene Saddle. Bring everything together with a gentle, not-too-bright white, such as Resene Half Barely There.

For warm brown neutrals, Meryl suggests Resene Coral with an accent wall in Resene Gargoyle. Complete the look with trim in Resene Thorndon Cream or Resene Rice Cake and wood stain finishes in Resene Colorwood Rock Salt and Resene Colorwood Bark.

Yellows, both bold and muted, can work well as unexpected neutrals when you get the balance right. Meryl suggests walls in Resene Lime White for a fresh base, with trim in bolder Resene Hot Toddy. Pair with deeper accents in Resene Cafe Royale and Resene Keppel.

For a soft green neutral look, Megan recommends working with either cooler silvery greens like Resene Pumice and Resene Tasman or warmer tropical greens like Resene Pale Leaf and Resene Dingley.

Whatever colour combinations you choose, warm bolder neutrals may be just the way to start experimenting with more colour in your home. H

or landscape designer Zöe Carafice, developing a garden on a small plot in Auckland's Grey Lynn was a passion project. Working closely with the owners and architect John Irving, Zöe set about creating this inner-city sanctuary to surround the home with levels of terraced garden.

"This garden needed to completely ground the architecture in green so I used a mix of groundcovers and climbers to create lush carpets and green walls providing a stage to show off the stars of the show, like the tree ferns and Japanese maples."

Zöe's vision was realised by the Create + Construct building team who produced the terraced levels and flat lawn area that crowns the top of the garden.

The graceful interior living room opens out almost entirely to the tiered garden. The exterior walls of the home are painted in Resene

Double Black White to accentuate the rich green of the foliage, while the terrace walls are finished in Resene X-200 CoolColour tinted to Resene Half Delta, the soft grey providing a visual connection between the house and garden.

feature

Zöe designed the garden to accentuate the architecture of the home. "The planting design I created for the garden was inspired by the Japanese concept of 'komorebi' which, loosely translated, means 'sunlight filtered through trees'." Large picture windows create frames to enjoy the rich greens of the garden from the living room, with trees and plants selected to play with shadows and cast light onto the concrete flooring of the room's interior.

While this is a relatively small inner-city garden, Zöe has packed in 45 species of plants with a mix of natives (some rare), flowering perennials, shrubs, edibles, climbers and trees. For Zöe, creating a garden is not just about the natural beauty it offers, but also about improving the health of the surrounding ecology. The garden then aids in providing bird corridors and food for pollinators as well as increasing permeable surfaces to help absorb stormwater. In short, this garden not only offers beauty, but also sustainability for its lively neighbourhood.

The colour palette for the garden was based on the timeless elegance of green and white, acknowledging the character of \rightarrow

the original home which faces the street, while feeling fresh and contemporary. The planting adds layers of green texture with white flowering Rain Lilies providing little moments of brightness amongst the areens.

The relaxed, naturalistic style of planting makes this garden easy to care for. A regular gardening schedule of weeding and gentle pruning is all that's required to keep it looking its best.

The terraced style of the garden also allowed enough space to create a small flat lawn that can be enjoyed on the upper level. From the pool level a timber boardwalk almost moves through the site like a waterfall, connecting to the relaxed dining area on the lower patio. Landing on the lower patio, the space is framed by a magnificent outdoor fireplace finished with Rockcote Cerano coloured to Resene Black. It mirrors an internal fireplace in the open plan living area, treated with Rockcote Otsumigaki also in Resene Black.

With 17 years of extraordinary garden creations to her name. Zöe has, for the last two years, been embracing the opportunity to create her own practice.

"In my previous role, I had the privilege of working on some very special projects such as the Chelsea Flower Show and a Garden for Peace to commemorate the First World War in Le Quesnoy, France.

This terraced garden retreat, while being lush and luxurious, is still a low maintenance option for the owners, requiring only periodic upkeep and care. As the garden space was not extensive, Zöe opted for this terrace style to provide the residents more space on the flat upper level to enjoy the swimming pool. This also afforded the option of enjoying each level of the garden from the extensive deck area on the ground level. The exterior terraced walls coated in Resene X-200 CoolColour in Resene Half Delta offer a lovely cool tone allowing the lush greenery of the plants and lawn to take centre stage. The large fireplace warms the outdoor lounge with the contrasting dark shade of Rockcote Cerano in Resene Black.

Gardening tips

Zöe recommends plant diversity wherever possible. "No matter how small your space is, my advice is don't be afraid to squeeze in as many different plants as you can. Even a pot on a balcony can be overflowing with fruit, flowers and native plants."

She also recommends taking into consideration the nearby ecosystem and look for ways to support it with plants and flowers. "Most importantly, get into the garden, however small your spot is. Even a small balcony can benefit from a beautiful and cared-for plant. Green is a wonderfully healing colour and bringing it to life in plant form, no matter the size, will enhance any space." H



If you prefer your exterior to stand out from the crowd, choose a shade like Resene Lemon Ginger to enhance your rear wall and use the grounding shade of Resene Foundry on the lower walls. This will allow your greenery to be the hero in your garden.

Landscape designer **Ben Hoyle** suggests this alternative scheme:

When it comes to terraced landscapes you don't need to start from scratch. Rather look at how you can thoughtfully tweak and layer in colour and texture with new materials and planting and make use of all those level changes. A cascading water feature treated with Resene FX Faux Rust Effect has been keyed into the existing terrace where it cantilevers water around the swimming pool and down to the courtyard below. Granite setts provide natural texture against the pool and upper terrace wall and are well complemented by the soft green tones of Resene Field Day. Modscene planters with citrus topiary underplanted with herbs provide another layer in which to plant and provide kai. The eye is naturally drawn along the boardwalk stained in Resene Woodsman wood oil stain tinted to Resene Uluru with a custom outdoor mural, providing animation and focus to the top terrace. Planters treated with Resene FX Faux Rust Effect float from the boundary wall painted in Resene Field Day adding to the calm greening cloak of this oasis.





what happens with the cans, pails and paints?

Cans are sent to steel recycling, pails are remade into more pails, solventborne paints are sent to solvent recovery so the solvents can be extracted and used in other industries and waterborne paints are donated to community groups and used in Paintcrete concrete manufacture.

top tips for making the most of your paint and paint packaging:

- Only buy what you need.
- Pour your paint into a separate paint pot and paint out of that, not your main container. This helps keep your main container of paint in good condition.
- Store leftover paint in a cool dry place to keep it in good condition.
- Use, donate or recycle your paint while the paint is still usable, not once it is dried up.
- Wash out paint pails and reuse them around your home as handy buckets.



Drop your used paint tins and pails to a designated Resene PaintWise collection centre at selected Resene ColorShops.



Way back in 1999, Resene started working on paint recycling. Little did the team know that after launching in 2004, within a few years, millions of packs of paint would be recycled through the Resene PaintWise service and recycled paint donations would be used all over the

country to cover graffiti and for local community beautification projects.

What was once considered rubbish, has now become a useful resource for so many. Paint recycling isn't without its challenges though. Resene works with 3R on the Resene PaintWise recycling programme and Trevor Tutt talks us through what happens to your paint once you drop it off to the Resene PaintWise service.

Step 1: Return paint

Deliver your paint cans or pails to your local PaintWise collection centre at your local Resene ColorShop. These can be empty or with residual paint inside. The cans are then distributed out to one of three recycling centres in Auckland, Christchurch and Hastings where the recycling journey begins.

Step 2: Separating the paint from the tin packaging

For the steel paint cans, a machine called a decanter is used. This literally crushes the can, so the can drops down one chute and the paint flows down the other chute. The paint is then pooled together in 1,000 litre containers and colour matched into one of Resene's 'community colours' ready for donation to community groups and councils. Steel is one of the most highly recycled materials in New Zealand, and it's a very straightforward process. Resene's plastic paint pails, however, go through a more comprehensive process.

Step 3: **Separating the paint from the plastic pail** The goal is to turn a used pail back into another new pail "We do that by literally scraping the paint out of the pail, dipping in with what's called a 'spigot' and then wrangling it with a spatula to finish the process. It's not dissimilar to cleaning out a cake tin", Trevor says laughing!

Step 4: Separating the polymers for recycling

The process now takes a more technical turn. The pails are stripped to separate the polymer streams out with a washing process. The remaining strips are then stacked and dried ready for the next stage of recycling. The pails are shredded and granulated before being moulded into a resin. The resin is then used to make 'new' Resene paint pails using 100% recycled plastic.

The whole process is effectively a full circle, as you leave your paint pail, and then get a fully recycled one at the other end. "It's probably the best example of a circular recycling scheme", says Trevor. This alongside the paint itself being recycled and donated to community projects by Resene is a very rewarding process.

So when you're thinking about painting up a storm, you can rest assured Resene will help you take care of your unwanted paint and paint packaging once you've finished the decorating. **H**

Repurposing a stained glass window makes all the difference to this DIY mini glasshouse.

Resene Bilbao B a daunting task. Using recycled windows of equal size makes this project a whole lot easier. We've used a stained glass window in this project. If you have a stained glass window you'd like to use that isn't the same size as your other windows, simply make a frame that matches those dimensions. Old windows may not match exactly - adjust your measurements to suit.

You will need:

- 4 recycled windows, equally sized
- 1 recycled window, for the roof
- Large side table or outdoor bench
- 65mm x 18mm treated radiata boards (the length of 3 x windows – the side and back windows)
- Timber offcut 35mm x 70mm (or similar) x width of glasshouse (used as a brace)
- Recycled knob or handle
- 2 galvanised hinges
- 6 x 35mm countersunk wood screws
- 6 x 50mm countersunk wood screws
- 15 x 65mm countersunk wood screws
- 4 x 75mm countersunk wood screws
- Resene paint in each of your chosen colours – we used Resene Bush and Resene Bilbao
- Paintbrush
- Masking tape
- 220 grit sandpaper
- Drill and bits
- Saw
- Pencil
- Measuring tape
- Clean rags

Step 1: Sand the window frames and table with 220 grit sandpaper to smooth out any rough edges and to allow the paint to grip. Wipe off sanding dust.

Step 2: For the table, apply two coats of Resene paint. You can use Resene Lumbersider Low Sheen or Resene Lustacryl semi-gloss for a higher sheen finish (prime first with Resene Quick Dry). Allow dry time between each coat. Allow the second coat to dry.

Step 3: Cut the 65mm x 18mm radiata board into three equal sizes (the length of your windows). Using 65mm screws, screw one piece to the bottom of one of the side windows, first drilling pilot holes, and positioning the board so the overhang is on the inside of the glasshouse. (You will screw this board into the table to hold the glasshouse in place.) Repeat for your second window – also a side window – positioning a

radiata board at the base, with the overhang on the inside.

Step 4: For the back window, cut an indent at each end of the board to allow the side panels to slot together. The indent will match the width of the panel, 65mm. As our back window is slightly shorter than our side windows, there is a small overhang at each end. Fix the board with screws to the base of the window, with the overhang on the inside.

Step 5: Apply masking tape to the inside of each window to protect the glass, then paint the window frames of all five windows in Resene Bilbao, allowing dry time between coats. Allow the second coat to dry.

Step 6: Place the two side windows on their sides and position the back window on top to form a box shape. Drill pilot holes then, using

three 65mm screws for each side (depending on the thickness of the window frames, you may need longer screws), screw the back window to the side windows.

Step 7: Turn the glasshouse right side up. Position the 'door' in place and, using a pencil, mark where the hinges will go. Drill pilot holes then screw the hinges in place, using 35mm screws.

Step 8: Attach the knob to the front of the door.

Step 9: Measure the width of the glasshouse and cut your offcut timber to the same width. Place it on top of the glasshouse at the front, just behind the door, and mark where the sides of the windows end.

Step 10: Cut an indent about 20mm deep and the width of the side windows, so that the

timber drops about 20mm into the glasshouse. Drill pilot holes, then screw in place, at either end, with 75mm screws. Drill one screw in from the top and one from the side, on either side. This board acts as both a brace for the box frame and elevated support for the ceiling window. Apply two coats of Resene Bilbao, allowing dry time between coats.

Step 11: Place the last window on top of the glasshouse. Drill pilot holes at each corner and screw into place with 75mm screws. Remove the masking tape from the windows and touch up the paint if necessary.

Step 12: Place the glasshouse onto the table and screw in place at the base using 50mm screws, two for each side and back.

How would you describe your interior style?

This is a tricky one, I like quite a few styles! My style is a mix of contemporary and classic. I like modern interiors but with a lot of layering to give them more detail. I've chosen the tile, carpet, paint palette, wood flooring and more that combine to create a cohesive interior. It's for people that love interior design and want a particular style throughout their home, but want to do it themselves rather than use a designer. People often lack the time to go hunting for products and there are so many that it can get confusing. This is for people who want the process simplified, getting a great design minus the second guessing yourself. There are also kitchen plans for each style and bathrooms are coming, so those tricky rooms to renovate are sorted too!

What are your current colour favourites?


I'm loving earthy neutrals instead of really bright whites. I've been using the half or eighth versions of colours like Resene Blanc, Resene Merino and Resene Parchment to paint rooms to get a slightly softer look. I'm enjoying working with greens and recently painted a client's dining room in Resene Smoky Green. I always love a dusky pastel like Resene Dusted Blue, Resene Lemon Grass and Resene Periglacial Blue. And deeper, jewel-like colours are definitely on my radar right now – I'm deciding between wine reds like Resene Arthouse and Resene Mulberry to paint a client's library room.

How do you recommend first-time decorators create a workable palette?

I like to look at items that make me feel happy. Look at your favourite pieces of furniture, art and fashion. There might be a natural colour scheme in a treasured antique rug, a statement painting or a favourite dress. Pull the colour palette out from that piece - often there will be a neutral, a main colour and an accent colour, which is a perfect combo for interiors! Also think about what activities take

place in this space and how do you want it to make people feel. How much natural light does the room have? Is it cold and southfacing or warm and north-facing? Northern light contains more yellow so is warmer and southern light contains more blue so is cooler, both of which totally change the appearance of the same paint colour. I like to use a pale, mid and intense version of the same colour in a space, even if it's a neutral. While a full strength paint version of a colour you love might be too much, the half, quarter or eighth version may be perfect.

What are you looking forward to seeing colour trend wise?

I love seeing what colours emerge each year as it's such a snapshot of the zeitgeist of that time, how people are feeling and how colour can improve their mindset. I often look at technology, fashion and automotive for signs of upcoming colour trends and am seeing a lot of lilac, marigold, lime green, khaki green and earthy russet brown tones. While you may not paint all your walls in these colours, they are refreshing to use as an accent for feature walls, art and accessories.

What's a great DIY tip for home decorators?

Use a paint sprayer! My husband and I have used these for interiors, fences and breeze blocks. You can hire them, they're relatively simple to get the hang of and they save you so much time! Practise on a secondary area first though to get the technique right. H




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
