Keen to stay Green

With summer nearly here, it's goodbye brown muddy fields and hello to lush grass and endless hours of lawnmowing. We all tend to associate our country with clean and green, however it doesn't and won't stay this way without a bit of help from us. After all, Mother Nature is a superb multi-tasker but even she can't fight off everything at once without a helping hand here and there.



Years back, people used vermilion paint coloured by pigments made from a *mercury compound* to paint their bathroom and green paints containing *arsenic* to finish the fence painting – both were considered perfectly good ways to get the painting done, yet today we wouldn't dream of using either because of the hazard involved.

Paint manufacturing has certainly come a long way since then (thank goodness!), with toxic substances such as mercury, arsenic and more recently, *lead*, banished from the lab forever. Of course there are other nasties in paint – even high solvent levels have an adverse impact on the environment, which is why you are gradually seeing *solventborne products* drift off the Resene shelves and **waterborne** *products* take their place. It's all part of a wider plan to minimise the damage to your health and the environment; the fact that these waterborne products typically are actually easier to use, work better and clean up in water is definitely an added bonus for you and us!

Paints are manufactured using a wide range of organic and inorganic materials. They can contain components that impact adversely on the environment at different stages of the product's life cycle releasing solvents and toxic substances during production, application, the service life of the coating and disposal. In response to growing concerns over VOC emissions, the *Environmental Choice programme* focuses on the need to reduce these emissions. Solventborne paints release significantly more VOC's per litre than waterborne paints, spurring Resene chemists to develop waterborne replacements for solventborne products and in fact a key motivation behind the original Resene waterborne enamels – **Resene Lustacryl** and **Resene Enamacryl**, both introduced in 1996.

Joining the Environmental Choice programme also gave Resene the nudge to solve a common headache (literally!) for customers caused by strong smelling paint. Resene chemists removed virtually all odorous (aka stinky)

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material from Resene Zylone Sheen, Resene Zylone 20 and Resene Ceiling Paint, giving users high quality products without strong smelling solvent odours. The end result? Customers can paint interior areas and put the area back into service the following day, rather than waiting for days for the strong



smelling odours to disappear. Best of all the job could be done without the normal headaches and nausea that were often caused by close encounters with solventborne paints in confined spaces!

On that note, the incidence of headaches, asthma, nausea, respiratory complaints, allergic reactions can also be easily reduced by simply choosing to use a low odour paint. The second part of fixing the headache was to introduce waterborne products that could be used in place of solventborne products, such as **Resene Enamacryl and Resene Lustacryl** and more recently **Resene Zylone SpaceCote**. All have minimal odour making painting inside a breeze.

Next time you're selecting a paint, think of yourself, your customers and the country around you and where you can opt for an Environmental Choice approved product – just look for the **EC logo** on our product data sheets and paint containers - it is confirmation that the product meets the requirements of the Environmental Choice Programme.
