## You will need:

- $400 \mathrm{~mm} \times 400 \mathrm{~mm} \times 400 \mathrm{~mm}$ MDF storage box (ours came from Mitre 10 Mega)
- Low tack masking tape
- Paintbrush
- Pencil
- Resene Lumbersider tinted to Resene Black
- Resene Quick Dry
- Resene testpots in the following colours: Resene Alabaster, Resene Bright Red, Resene Broom, Resene Elvis, Resene Kermit and Resene West Side
- Ruler


Step one
Apply one coat of Resene Quick Dry to the outside of the box and allow two hours to dry.


Step five
Paint a few random squares on each side of the cube with one coat of Resene West Side.


Step two
Apply two coats of Resene Black to the outside of the box and allow two hours for each coat to dry.


Step six
Paint a few random squares on each side of the cube with one coat of Resene Bright Red and Resene Alabaster.


Step three
Measure and mask each side of the cube into nine equal squares, as shown, using low tack masking tape.


## Step eight

Before the second coat has dried, carefully remove the masking tape. Allow two hours for the paint to dry.

Keep the kids happy and create this fun cube style games table from a MDF storage box and a few Resene testpots.


## Top tip:

Mark painted the background wall with Resene SpaceCote Low Sheen tinted to Resene Half Alabaster and the skirting board with Resene Lustacryl tinted to Resene Half Alabaster.


## Other ideas:

Create a funky dice cube by painting a MDF box with Resene Nero and spots with Resene Alabaster.
